Overview

A survey was conducted targeting residents of the Chippewa Local Schools district during the month of June 2022.


In total, 229 responses were submitted. Respondents were solicited via posts on the Chippewa Levy Committee Facebook Page, with a small amount (less than 20 overall) solicited through as through business cards distributed to through local businesses and printed copies of the survey available at the Library.


Survey responses were collected with no requirement to provide personally identifiable information (PII), though respondents could provide their contact information if they wished to be contacted about the survey responses they provided.


What is your age? 229 responses






The <u>2020 Census</u> reported a much more even age distribution than responded to this survey; much higher in the 35-45 age group and lower 65+ age group.


Where do you live? 229 responses




Do you own or rent your residence? 229 responses



What is your employment status? 229 responses




Do you have children currently in the school district? 229 responses





Have you had children attend the school district in the past? 229 responses




area demographics, this does likely indicate diversity in terms of multi generation respondents.

Did you attend this school district? 229 responses




What gender do you identify with?


View of the district community


- Small town feel and Schools were generally the biggest draws to living in the district. Churches, Work, and Community Programs and Groups the least.
- Cost of Living seemed to be a mild factor (neither highest nor lowest).
- Family lives here was either the highest or lowest factor.


- Respondents generally agreed 'Lack of local businesses' as the biggest challenge, and 'Churches' the lowest.
- All other categories were even across rankings generally.

Do you see this community as one set up for a sustainable future? 229 responses




Selected detail responses:


- "Our township is reluctant to allow new businesses to move in, and the school district leadership pushes non-sensical spending while trying to promote "transparency" (turf field, digital wall-of-fame)"
- "Too much division. Lack of trust and all pushback on any change makes forward movement difficult. Need businesses to help bring in Tax revenue for schools and village"
- "There's no togetherness in the community anymore. there's no loyalty or transparency."
- "Doylestown does a good job of maintaining the status quo but doesn't seem interested in investing in improvements or expansion with the intent of growing the community's size or demand. "


 Respondents generally aligned on all categories being values the school district provides, with "Excellent education for our students" and "Excellent staff and teachers" being the highest. What do you believe are the biggest challenges facing the school district? Rank each item on a 1-5 scale, 5 being the biggest challenge with and 1 being the least challenge. Note that if you are on a mobile device you may need to side scroll to rank an item 4 or 5.



- Respondents saw "Communication" as the largest challenge, with "Facilities in poor condition", "Administration and School Board", and "High taxes for residents" as the next largest.
- "Lack of extracurricular activities" and "Teachers and staff" were the least challenge as seen by respondents.
- "Giving students a quality education" and "Career preparation" were considered median challenges.

What are the primary ways you get information and form opinions on the school district? Check all that apply.




- Respondents mostly indicated Facebook and Neighbors/Friends were the primary ways to get information and form opinions on the school district.


Are you aware of the school district having a strategic plan? 229 responses




This is a bit concerning, especially with the number of comments regarding lack of planning and future thinking.



- Respondents rated the leadership of the school district lowest in areas of transparency, district resident communication, and fiscal/facilities management.
- Respondents generally rated 'Education excellence' as the highest for the leadership of the school district.
- 'Staff hiring and retention' and 'Communication with parents' had median responses.


Future Directions

Decommission Hazel Harvey School and build an addition to the existing Chippewa Intermediate to house Grades K-2 (including preschool programs) ²²⁹ responses




Move all school buildings onto the current Chippewa Jr/Sr High School site, purchasing additional property as needed.



Other Feedback

What other feedback would you like to share about the community? Selected responses

- "It would show the community can progress if the community spoke with the folks who have the real information versus the "area pot stirrers" and the folks who are always negative."
- "Enjoy living here and would like to continue but feel city leaders are holding Doylestown back and not focusing on building or supporting downtown business and expanding tax base to help lower personal tax"
- "Communication and education are key"
- "We need to bring more businesses into the community. Like a grocery store. Not a convenience store but small grocery we also need more restaurants. Our downtown needs more modernization we look run down. We need to generate these things to also help lower our taxes."
- "Kids are our future, we need to invest in them"

What other feedback would you like to share about the school district? Selected responses

- "Have transparency. Show where the money is going. Explain why these things have gone to the way side for so long. There's truly no excuse to have Hazel Harvey in such terrible condition when so much money was dumped into athletic facilities. It's embarrassing as an alumni and now a parent that out young students aren't valued or appreciated enough to give them a safe building."
- "I feel some leadership in the district seems more involved and welcoming than others. I can see a disconnect from the outside and it feels uncomfortable at times."
- "We moved here for the schools and have voted for all the levies until the last one. I don't believe in writing the government a blank check without accountability. Plan the project, bid it out, establish the budget and timeline and then present it to the voters. If I know what I'm getting for my \$, I will absolutely vote for it. "
- "We have some excellent educators and staff working for our children and deserve better classrooms and technology "
- "Continue to improve and keep the school district informed the best you can. Continue to be transparent. "

Key Insights

Community growth and vibrancy is an issue

- Respondents connect lack of local businesses to lack of growth and vibrancy in the community.
- Respondents would like to see leadership forward thinking and developing long term plans for a stronger community.
- Leadership should be more proactive in developing and communicating a strategic plan

Communication and transparency are challenges

- Communication and transparency generally rated as the biggest challenges across questions and groups.
- While Facebook has been cited as a primary source of information with respondents, there was considerable feedback to have more diversity in the methods of communication.
- Many respondents cited information that has been publicly debunked, meaning there is a fair amount of disinformation filling the communication void.
- Leadership should invest in ways to be more intentional with communication with district residents.

Respondents generally love the community and the schools.

- Generally the "small town feel" of the community is a draw for residents
- Respondents value the teachers and staff and the educational excellence provided.
- Leadership should continue to focus on the positive values and stories of the district and community
